The conference focuses on best practice in supporting LGBT children and young people across education and service provisions. Whilst there won't be a specific focus on how to capture data, we will draw from our <u>School Report (2017)</u> and hopefully be launching some preliminary findings on LGBT NEETs as well. 

Thanks for your time on Wednesday, it was good to catch up.

I am including here the report that we produced on <u>the guidance that is being used for Census</u> <u>rehearsal</u>, which also details some findings from the qualitative testing. You can see in the report the guidance that was tested and the version we are using for the rehearsal. What isn't in this the report is the research questions that our interviewers probed respondents on – these were taken from stakeholder feedback that you (and others) provided, so thankyou – it was very useful to be able to test a variety of solutions and gives us confidence that this approach works. In the report, we say that following the rehearsal we will analyse how well this has worked, which will include seeking feedback from the contact centre staff who will be using this guidance when handling calls from the public. I am happy as always to take your feedback on the guidance.
